Speaking Topics...

A Place to Belong: Celebrating Diversity and Kinship in the Home and Beyond

Gone are the days when socially conscious parents feel comfortable teaching their children to merely tolerate others. Instead, they are looking for a way to authentically embrace the fullness of their diverse communities. In this session. families of all backgrounds will receive guidance on celebrating cultural heritage and embracing inclusivity in the home and beyond. We'll discuss how to foster an environment where children feel secure in their own personhood and culture, enabling them to better understand and appreciate people who are racially and culturally different. Parents will walk away with tools to empower children to embrace their unique identities while feeling beautifully tethered to their global community.

Books as Mirrors, Windows, and Sliding Glass Doors

When children are unable to see themselves reflected in their schoolbooks, they fail to develop positive feelings of self-worth. And when they lack occasions to examine similarities and differences between themselves and others, they miss out on valuable opportunities for recognizing the shared humanity that binds all people together. A mirror is a story that reflects your own culture and helps build your identity, a window is a resource that offers you a view into someone else's experience, and a sliding glass door invites you to enter another's world. In this session, we will examine the use of all three types of books in our homes as we educate our children while embracing their individuality and honoring others.

Worldschooling: Taking the Show on the Road

Traveling abroad is a dream that many families share but figuring out how to traverse across the continents (or even the next state over) with children in tow while homeschooling can feel overwhelming and even impossible. In this session, we'll discuss what learning away from home entails and how regular everyday families can make it happen on a budget. We'll also consider the question of how to raise globally minded children when traveling outside the country isn't a realistic possibility. The answer may surprise you!

Claiming Freedom: Embracing Contradictions Amid Motherhood

Through a series of relatable anecdotes, Amber leads mamas down a freedom path where they can embrace life's contradictions and claim the ability to explore, dabble, grow, and connect without bounds. Specifically, she dives into four freedoms that mothers can gift themselves and their peers while living and loving well within community.

Finding Freedom in Charlotte Mason

When parents and teachers rely on intuition, reflective practice, and common sense to revise their application of Mason's principles based on the family or child at hand, they often walk away feeling as though these "departures" are separating them from the more legitimate world of CM purists. This session will reframe some of our thinking in this area as we discover that embracing freedom is not an educational or moral failure but an inherent aspect of a true Charlotte Mason education.

Teaching Hard History in a Beautiful Way

Home educators are more motivated now than ever to have meaningful conversations with their children about our country's complicated past and the forces that shaped the society we live in today. But most of us never learned about the tough topics in school, and the books traditionally read in homeschool circles rarely provide much assistance. During our time together, we'll discuss how to approach hard history in our homes with honesty and compassion in an age-appropriate way.

Roots & Branches: Pursuing Universal Brotherhood Through Family Heritage

Building authentic relationships across racial, ethnic, and cultural lines requires self-awareness, humility, and a willingness to sit with the tension that often accompanies the melding of different viewpoints or even competing aims. Before children can be expected to thrive in diverse spaces and relationships, they must develop agency through personal identity. Kids (and adults too) find it difficult to honor the humanity of others when they are disconnected from their own personhood. We'll discuss how we can use family culture and intergenerational history to deeply water our children's roots as they spread wide branches towards others.

Sparking Curiosity and Delight in Childhood

When children show strong abilities in one area or another, the adults in their lives often encourage them to pursue hobbies and careers that play off those strengths. That may certainly be an advantage, but sometimes the strategy can leave children feeling incomplete. In this session, we'll explore a path that supports academic growth while sparking curiosity in childhood. Learn how to spread an inspiring feast of ideas and come alongside your kids as they dive deeply into the passions and interests that make them come alive!

The "Mothering" Voices We All Need to Hear

Amidst the busy days of mothering, we often seek advice and direction from books, podcasts, mentor moms, and peers. All of these are worthy options for gaining insight and perspective, but there are three specific "mothering" voices available to all that will breathe more life into our homes than any other. In this session, we'll dive deeply into the prismatic nature of motherhood and walk away with a deeper understanding of how to use the tools at our disposal to mother well.

Dear Sister: A Letter to the Mama Whose Husband Never Does Enough

You are single-handedly taking care of yourself, the kids...and him. He goes to work every day to support your family, and you appreciate him for that, but still. There are many moments where an extra helping hand would make your day so much easier. You would feel more appreciated and less exhausted at the end of the day if he would just do a little more. Does this sound familiar? In this session. Amber shares biblical truths that she learned, how they were revealed, and why her marriage radically changed when her eyes were opened.

A Living Education: Charlotte Mason and Your Family

A living education is teeming with ideas that breathe life into our lessons and spill over into our daily rhythms. Amber O'Neal Johnston will discuss some of the unique aspects of a Charlotte Mason education and how you can begin to incorporate them into your home. She'll also share how freedom and flexibility are inherent aspects of this educational philosophy, making it possible for families everywhere to embrace the principles while curating a home atmosphere filled with truth, goodness, and beauty.

Delighting in the Early Years

With children of various ages and stages – middle school, upper elementary, lower elementary, and a tagalong - Amber O'Neal Johnston has faithfully shepherded multiple children through the difficult and delightful early years. In this session, Amber will share her journey through the first years of her children's home life while highlighting the beautiful aspects that she relishes, the not-so-great things she wishes she'd done differently, and the ways that birth order and family circumstances have impacted each child's experience.

Sacred vs. Secular: The Power of Undivided Mothering

"We allow no separation to grow up between the intellectual and 'spiritual' life of children but teach them that the Divine Spirit has constant access to their spirits. and is their Continual Helper in all the interests, duties and joys of life." When Amber first read these words by British educator Charlotte Mason, she was knee-deep in diapers, breastfeeding, cooking, and housework, but something called to her. In this session, we'll discuss the realities of a life lived without the defined separation of secular vs. sacred and what this means for mamas and their little ones.

From Apathy to Joy: The Invisible Gifts of Motherhood

When starting a family, we're often full of excitement and apprehension in equal measure. We want to lean into family and home but don't want to lose ourselves in the process. Thinking that there's no room for curating a childhood of wonder and our own personal growth, we often choose to put our children first and lovingly dive headfirst into what we believe will be an entirely sacrificial path. But through motherhood, we receive rarely mentioned "invisible" gifts, and acknowledging them can be lifegiving.

The Inheritance of Homemaking

For some people, homemaking feels like a thing of the past – something pursued by grandmothers and women who lack opportunities. Full-time mothering and slow childhood are often misunderstood and undervalued in today's hurried world, but the idea of homemaking has been etched into the hearts of many women (and their husbands). In this session, we'll discuss the power of keeping a home and how approaching homemaking as an intergenerational gift and beloved profession can open hearts, minds. and many doors.

Belonging Together: Managing the Seasons of Community and Fellowship

Cultivating intentional opportunities for children to explore ideas and grow within a community of like-minded learners is a priceless experience. When families are regularly situated alongside others who share their desires for a living education rooted in Charlotte Mason's principles, they reap the immediate benefits of relational learning. But once homeschool co-ops and groups are seeded, they must be watered and cared for through fruitful and difficult seasons. In this session, we'll discuss how to manage community and fellowship amid various stages of development while maintaining a healthy atmosphere of belonging for yourself, your children, and the families within your community.

Relational Living, Learning, and Loving

Interacting with living books, things, and people. Learning amid the mundane. Loving our family, friends, and community well. These are the relational aspects of home that fuel growth and contentment. Home education blurs the lines between home and "school," and it offers a unique opportunity for connection with and among our children. When we approach our days as opportunities for relationships to flourish (and be tested), we're able to experience the fullness of educating our children at home. This session will quide parents in curating a home atmosphere rooted in relational living, learning, and loving.

The Promises of Poetry

"...the magic of poetry makes knowledge vital, and children and grown-ups quote a verse which shall add blackness to the ashbud, tender wonder to that "flower in the crannied wall," a thrill to the song of the lark." (Charlotte Mason, Vol. 6, p. 328)

The first time my voice cracked at the raw emotion incited by a poet's words, I was caught off guard. It was a compelling moment, but I didn't know what to make of it because I wasn't fully invested in a life of lingering over stanzas and considering the meaning of unexpected words. Charlotte Mason wrote, "Poetry takes first rank as a means of intellectual culture." Still. even as I began to recognize the power of poetry to heal and guide, I struggled to morph a school lesson with my children into a meaningful pursuit apart from dissecting each verse to bits. But slowly, nearly imperceptibly, I began to truly experience poetry. In this session, I'll share my journey as we discuss the role of poetry in our children's lives and our own. "A thousand thoughts that burn come to us on the wings of verse." Let's see if we can capture a few.

A Path to Belonging and Kinship

On the heels of protests and political divisiveness, our nation is bursting with social unrest as Americans wrestle with defining who we are and what we stand for as a disparate yet connected group of individuals. In many cases, meaningful messages get mired down in polarizing ideologies, but the truth is that we all love our children, value our communities, and want the best for both. Amid all the noise, there is a quiet call for mothers to unite as we raise self-confident children who hold genuine affection for others. As sisters by choice, we can partner as we pour into home, the treasured space where our children form their first attachments and perspectives on the world, where belonging and kinship burn brightly. We can raise children who embrace their unique identities while feeling beautifully tethered to their neighbors, nation, and global community, and we can do it together.

Diversifying the Feast: Finding Beauty Through Culturally Rich Learning

There are innumerable ways to integrate voices of color into our children's lessons naturally and consistently through the years. Formal and informal opportunities for diversifying the feast exist within history, literature, music, art, poetry, and more. Some studies will lead our students to grapple with complex stories, tragedies. and trials. But we also have a unique opportunity to highlight the triumphs and joys rooted in every culture. This session will discuss specific ways to shape an inclusive home atmosphere that values people of color and the ideas that their stories and gifts convey to our children.

The Joy of Making: Reclaiming the Lost Art of Handicrafts

"We make in order to slow down. To connect with others. To express ideas and emotions, feel competent, create something tangible and long-lasting. And to feed the soul." These words by author Melanie Falick remind us that handcraft is more than just a hobby reserved for our most creative children. Working with their hands tethers our children to previous generations as they immerse themselves in the present, and creating beautiful and useful things encourages kids to think of others. Handicrafts stimulate creativity and imagination, provide practice for the habits of concentration and attention, and so much more. In this session, we'll explore the lost art of handcraft as part of a broad education that prepares our children for the real world while gifting them with the joy that comes from making things by hand.

Beholding Beauty in Unexpected Places

Our beauty sense in literature, art, and other areas of life should be expansive – not solely based on the narrow confines of familiarity. Our recognition of truth, goodness, and beauty should also remain wonderfilled, informed, and thoughtful. It can't be left to develop entirely on its own in the wild. Rather, it must be carefully considered, pruned, and cultivated. In this session, I'll share my own path toward beauty as we discuss the various ways that our attention to beauty can breathe life into our homes.





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
